worker strata encompassing one-third of the total labour force. On the other hand, Israel's continued encroachment over Arab lands, and the physical challenge to the Palestinian's continued survival in their traditional communities, renders the seemingly stabilized relationship between the residual peasant farmstead and the peasant-workers' involvement in the urban sector, into an increasingly insecure proposition.

What restrains this insecurity in the peasants' ability to survive is

Israel's own dependence on this precarious balance.
